We don't know Margaret's age, status, or how she was linked to Jenet Pennycuik and Janet Bishop. Perhaps they were neighbours - Penicuik was a small village in those days.

It's worth noting that this is the second occasion in 1629 that a group of three women were accused together. Was there something threatening at the time, about three women being close friends?

Some modern readers mis-read Cuthbertson as 'Enderson' in the court records - due to the fancy writing script of the day. Cuthbertson was likely to have been Margaret's maiden name - in the 1600s, women didn't change their surname even when they married.

They burned me on the eighteenth day o'
